

Sundry times ...

One of my favourite prayers, commonly used at funerals, runs like this:

O Lord, support us all the day long of this troublous life, until the shades lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed; the fever of life is over, and our work is done. Then, Lord, in your mercy grant us safe lodging, a holy rest, and peace at the last; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

It is a prayer that captures the eternal nature of God, unchanging; compared with the temporal nature of humanity, ever changing. It also alludes to the promise Jesus made to His disciples that He was going ahead of them to prepare a lodging place appropriate individually for them in heaven (cf John 14:1-6). All of this gives perspective to the finite limits of our lives and experience on earth.

On Ash Wednesday we celebrated with a School Eucharist when our Church School children considered together the importance of Lent as a season to make space for God and consider the deeper truths of the life of faith in Jesus Christ. The culmination of the season is Good Friday when we commemorate His sacrifice whereby we may know God and discover our true selves. Then, because of His glorious resurrection, we know Him to be with us always having already associated in His life with our lives on earth. All of this helps us realise a dimension beyond the temporal limits of our humanity.

Yet we find ourselves confined – even imprisoned – within these limits ever more in the strains and stresses of our modern world, which lives for what it can get for itself in the present. Most people do not think much about the eternal dimension; particularly in our affluent culture. We live for the moment and after the closure of death others celebrate the life. Little time is spent today considering death as a gateway to life and access to eternity. The Church identifies with our culture, but should also challenge it and be challenged by it.

You will be aware by now of the “Challenge to All” project undertaken by the church. Part of this challenge is the process of ‘taking stock’. It is a process of considering ‘who we are’, ‘what we do’, ‘how we live’, and, ‘with what?’ What difference does our life make; to whom, and upon what does it depend? These are spiritual questions that effect our temporal nature and context. They also effect each other.

Norman Taylor’s contribution from his research of Rev. Dr. Thomas Fuller bears upon this subject of sundry times and eternity. You will find the background write up repeated in case you missed it in previous editions.

I hope to see you as we celebrate the resurrection of Christ at Easter.

Norman writes: ‘ *“Good thoughts in Bad Times”* was the name given by Revd. Dr. Thomas Fuller to a book he wrote in Exeter during the Civil War. Fuller was Vicar of Broadwindsor from 1634 to 1642. Then he went to be Curate of the Savoy Chapel in London, where he tried to promote reconciliation between King and Parliament; but, when this failed, he, being a Royalist, went to join King Charles 1 in Oxford. He became chaplain to Sir Ralph Hopton’s army, sharing with them in the battles in the West Country, and eventually joining the Royal Court in Exeter. After its surrender to Cromwell’s forces in 1646, he returned to London homeless and unemployed, and wrote (who can blame him?) *“Good Thoughts in Worse Times”*.

Here is an exert for this month:

“Lord, I confess this morning I remembered my breakfast, but forgot my prayers. And as I have returned no praise, so thou mightst justly have afforded me no protection. Yet thou has carefully kept me to the middle of this day, entrusted me with a new debt before I have paid the old score. It is now noon, too late for a morning, too soon for an evening sacrifice. My corrupt heart prompts me to put off my prayers till night; but I know it too well, or rather too ill, to trust it. I fear, if till night I defer them, at night I shall forget them. Be pleased, therefore, now to accept them. Lord, let not a few hours the later make a breach; especially seeing (be it spoken not to excuse my negligence, but to implore thy pardon) a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday. I promise hereafter, by thy assistance, to bring forth fruit in due season. See how I am ashamed the sun should shine on me, who now newly start in the race of my devotions, when he like a giant hath run more than half his course in the heavens.”




UPLYME & LYME REGIS HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Jenny & Ivan Harding's gardening tips

Spring is late this year – the snowdrops have hung on well due to the cold weather. When they have finished flowering divide and replant any congested clumps to give optimum flowering in future years.

If you were sunning yourself in Barbados during autumn bulb planting time and your garden needs a lift, buy some already in bud or flowering and pop them in the garden. Miniature daffodils are especially good as they don't get damaged in bad weather like the taller varieties and of course will come up next year. Try some of the dwarf varieties like WP Milner (10 inches tall with creamy white flowers) Little Gem (yellow trumpet 4-5 inches tall) or multi-headed fragrant varieties like Petrel (10 inches tall, white cupped flowers) or Baby Moon (7 inches tall, delicate yellow flowers).

Other spring plants will be flowering by now e.g Anemones, Fritillarias, Primroses, Brunnera, Pulmonaria, Hellebores, Symphytum and Omphalodes to name a few. April is an excellent time to plant giving them plenty of time to clump up and establish.

Helleborus orientalis come in varied colours from spotted, white, pink or red, while *Helleborus foetidus* (stinking hellebore) has lime green flowers with a pink edge – excellent for brightening up a shady spot or against a dark background. By the way it only 'stinks' if you crush it, which as the sap can be a skin irritant, is not a good idea! *Omphalodes verna* and *Brunnera macrophylla* are both early season perennials with blue starry flowers (rather like forget-me-not) that enjoy full or partial shade.

Symphytum rubrum (comfrey) comes into leaf early (good ground cover) and has pinky red flowers in early spring to summer. *Pulmonarias* (lungwort) are various shades of purple but one of our favourites is Blue Ensign - a beautiful deep blue.

Why not plant some native primroses on a shady bank or some cowslips in an open site.

But whatever don't be slaves to your garden – plant densely and mulch to cut down on weeding

Youth Work in Uplyme's Community

Ever since I started as youth-worker at Uplyme Church one of my primary aims has been to provide opportunities for children and young people to explore their talents in an encouraging and fun environment. Something I believe has a Biblical basis and thus the need for churches to provide activities for the community in which they live.

At Uplyme Church we run a number of activities, some on a regular basis, others as one-offs. This helps bring the young people of the area together in a positive and fun environment. We run trips to camps such as SPREE, the Crusader Football Camp and hopefully in the future, camps run by South West Youth Ministries, where more sports are played, musical instruments twanged and fun had on a scale that's unimaginable. Elsewhere! Uplyme Church's very own holiday club, run in August, is a taster for these events combining sports, crafts, music and generally gunge-tinged madcap fun of the sort you don't normally get to take part in, but only watch on telly.

Then there is our regular groups, Explorers on Mondays after school (7 -11s), Xplosion every other Friday evenings (10-14s) and Alpha for 14+ every Thursday - each of these are a chance to explore the Christian faith in a non-pressured environment with like-minded friends. Each one has an amazing feel of community and togetherness and we've seen many young lives transformed for the better in a friendly, trusting and encouraging environment.

There's opportunities for adults and older young people in helping out with all of these - whether as a gunge-slinging holiday clubber or sport expert for example - which fulfils another of our aims in bringing young and old together to build friendships across the generations. DID YOU KNOW ABOUT?

The Parish Magazine

is produced and run by the Church for the people of the parish.

Did you know?

All the work producing & editing the magazine is carried out by volunteers in their spare time. The printing of the magazine is done at a very reduced rate by a church member. The majority of the magazines are delivered to most of the homes in the parish by members of the church. On average 700 copies of the magazine are produced, 10 issues are printed each year. Income from subscription, donation and token advertising still leaves the church with a £350 deficit each year!

Why do we do it?

The short answer is "as a service to the community". The 'PARISH NEWS' is seen as the newsletter of the village telling people 'What's On' & 'What's happening' in the parish, interspersed with articles of Church life, & has been part of this community for many years. It has always been run by the church and will continue to be delivered to all homes in the parish.

Computers and the internet are invaluable tools, and we couldn't produce a magazine without them. But people still pick up and thumb through the magazine to find the email or address of the local web site, and web sites need the magazine to let people know where they are!

If you value the magazine as part of the village information service, supporting village life then think about donating 50p per month for the magazine, it's not a lot and would make a huge difference.

(If every house in the parish participated we could get a proper editor who knew what he was doing!)

DID YOU KNOW ABOUT?

LINKS BETWEEN CHURCH & SCHOOL

Everyone is familiar with the 'school next to the church,' but how long has Mrs Ethelston's been providing Christian education in the village?

For the answer, read on:

As a voluntary aided Church school, the Governing body has a majority of 'Foundation Governors' appointed by the church to ensure its Christian ethos is maintained. The school has therefore a unique opportunity to live its daily life based firmly on the Christian Gospel and, not surprisingly, its links with the Church of St Peter & St Paul are very strong. The children feel that it is very much 'their church.'

Did you know the school attends the church:

- every Friday when the Rector and parents join us and the PTA organise coffee afterwards once a month
- for 2 School Eucharists each term, usually centred around a Saints' Day or feast, celebrated by the Rector
- for Harvest, Christmas, Easter (Holy Week) and the end of year Annual Celebration & Leavers' Service.)
- for occasional Sunday Services, e.g. dance/drama group or School Choir, including Education Sunday & the Parish Carol Service. In recent years our children have attended the Remembrance Day service in church and laid a wreath from the school on the village's War Memorial

Did you know that:

- the Headteacher is a member of the Uplyme & Axmouth Ministry Team, leading services or preaching in both churches and meeting monthly
- the Parish Youth Worker, Irve Griffiths, is a parent and a regular visitor to the school.
- Irve leads School Worship fortnightly and runs the Explorers after-school club on Mondays.
- The JC's, Junior Church group, are based in the school on Sundays
- Explorers' Saturday morning football is attended by many of our children

Did you know that all villagers have an open invitation to any school service? It is your school and has been involved in Christian education for over 135 years. Our Christian Foundation is fundamental and central to our school and influences our work in many ways. We believe that the school needs to play a vital part in the life of the church and village. Long may it continue!

DID YOU KNOW ABOUT ?

Crusader Football

It's Saturday morning in October 1998, it's 9am and passing the playing field in Uplyme, you see 6 or 7 lads playing football, nothing unusual about that you might think!

Now go forward a few years. It's Saturday morning April 2006, it's 9am and passing the playing field in Uplyme you stop and see between 20 & 40 youngsters, aged between 4 & 18 training and playing football. What's going on? Is it the local football club, the school?

NO, it's the church! Every Saturday between September and May for the past 7 years or so the Church has run a regular football session on the field. Born, out of the desire of these original lads just wanting to play football; it has seen over the years some 100 + youngsters, of both sexes, coming along and joining in this fun filled hour on a Saturday morning.

We have represented South West Crusaders in the National 6-a-side competition no less than 6 times, winning the Under 11 Shield at the tournament twice (being the only team to have done so in the past 15 years). Through the competition we have also had the opportunity of meeting and playing teams from all over Great Britain.


God directed a couple of church members all those years ago, to help the lads wanting to play football. Today the church is still running it, with the help of local dads & two of the original players who gained so much from that first group that they wanted to pass their experiences onto others, and ensure that the football session was available to today's youngsters.

There is no charge, the time and equipment are given free, all are welcome, no one is too old or too young. Children come from all around the area to join in. Bleary eyed parents are amazed at what they see. This is God at work here in Uplyme.




2 large eggs, well beaten.


- 1 Use a basin fitting well over a saucepan of water which is kept simmering, or in the top of a double boiler.

14-20 May 2006

Hi!

My name's Clare Whitworth and I'm travelling to Tanzania on the 8th April with a conservation charity called Greenforce to volunteer on a project working in the Maasai lands with the local people. I'll be there for 11 weeks to help carry out a unique biodiversity study with the WWF, educate the Maasai about conservation issues and teach them basic English. I have been working all year to pay for this project but I have to raise more than £4000 so whilst I am in Tanzania I am going to attempt to trek up Mt. Kilimanjaro and have been asking for sponsorship for this challenge.

I have attached a copy of an information sheet I have put together about the project I am volunteering on.

GREENFORCE

Firstly, we learn about the current conservation issues in Tanzania, the country's culture and language, and we are trained in the conservation techniques we will be carrying out on the project.



Here are a few pictures of the Maasai community I will be living with for the 8 week project.



The main project will be helping to carry out a unique survey where we will be encountering a large variety of different types and species of wildlife. The specific focus for my project will be on large mammals but we will all carry out investigations into other animals and be in charge of the survey information for each particular animal group.



We will also be teaching English to some of the Maasai people.

Finally, I will attempt to climb Mount Kilimanjaro, which is the tallest freestanding mountain in the world and is described as the 'roof of Africa' standing at 5895 metres.



The adder emerged from hibernation late, easily distinguished from grass snake, by bold black markings down its back and not bigger than 2 ft long, whereas the harmless grass snake is a good deal longer.

There have been several sightings of the Goldcrest, and female Firecrest. The Bullfinches are about, dangerous to the Apple and Pear trees, loving the juicy flower buds.

Report on Uplyme Parish Council Monthly Meeting held on 8th March 2006

Planning

Applications Refused by East Devon District Council

Old Woodhouse, Woodhouse Lane. Erection of building to create studio, offices & ancillary accommodation.

Applications considered

The Old Chapel, Rocombe. Erection of 2 storey extension & porch. No objections. Approval recommended

Holcombe Granary, Holcombe Lane. Erection of agricultural machinery store/shed. No objections. The location of the building is better and the finish more in keeping with its surroundings but it is suggested that adequate screening is achieved through tree planting. Approval Recommended.

The Downs, Woodhouse Hill. Replacement Garage. No objections. Approval recommended.

The Spinney, Rocombe Bottom. Replacement Garage. No objections. Approval recommended.

Queens Cottage, Harcombe Road. 2 Storey extension and alterations to front elevation including dormer windows and porch. No objections. Approval recommended.

Lyme Regis Golf Club, Timber Hill, Lyme Regis. Erect single storey timber clad golf driving range, small office and store, and extend car park. The Golf Club have resubmitted an application for a driving range but councillors were unanimously in agreement that this proposal should be opposed.

Other Planning

Land at St Mary's Lane, Uplyme. Appeal allowed against refusal of planning permission to install, and enforcement to remove, wooden gates.

Barnes Meadow. East Devon DC have issued a Breach of Condition Notice requiring the landowners, Wykeham Homes Limited, to:-

a) implement the approved details of landscaping required by condition 4 of the relevant planning permission by 31st March 2006 and

b) submit to and secure approval of the Council to the phasing programme required by condition 9 of the relevant planning permission in respect of that part of the programme as is relevant to the northern frontage of the land (within 3 months).

Footpaths The survey of the footpaths has now been completed. Footpath 100 is to undergo works which will start on 10th April

Children's Playground

Cllr Clarke-Irons reported that the Committee for Uplyme Playground has been hard at work. Total funds to date amount to £9120 which includes a grant of £5000 from the lottery 'Awards For All' scheme. The draw for the South West Trains 1st Class railway tickets was won by Mr N.Gregory who has kindly donated them for CUP to allocate them as it sees fit. Volunteers are now sought to help clear the old equipment before redevelopment can be started. Would anyone willing to help please contact Jonathan Clarke-Irons on 01297 32697. The debris will also have to be disposed of, so if anyone can help with this, once again please contact Jonathan Clarke-Irons.

Proposed Autograss meeting The Parish Council understands that the South Somerset Autograss Club intends to hold a meeting on Sunday 19th March, with other meetings to follow, on land at the junction of Springhead Road with the Coach Road (See map attached). The Parish Council is extremely concerned as this site can only be accessed by a single track road (Springhead Road) and in turn all the traffic attending this event will have to leave the A35 at either the very dangerous turning into Red Lane or into Harcombe Road. Similarly, serious

congestion would arise when vehicles leave the event at the finish, this would presumably include vehicles with trailers transporting the autograss vehicles. In view of these concerns the Parish Council has written to the Devon & Cornwall Constabulary requesting that arrangements are made for suitable police presence on the day in order to monitor the situation so that consideration can be given as to whether future events should be stopped.

Parish Plan A proof copy is awaited from the printers and once this is approved copies will be available for purchase. It will also be published on the Parish Council Website www.uplymeparishcouncil.org

Future of Post Office Card Accounts

Post Office Card Accounts are the method by which people who do not have a bank account or who wish to have their pension paid in cash, receive payments from their local post office. The Department of Work and Pensions have said they will not be renewing the contract for Post Office Card Accounts in 2010, In the meantime The Department of Work and Pensions plan to stop any new pensioners or jobseekers having the option of a Post Office Card Account, and are encouraging existing Post Office Card Account holders to switch to direct payment into a bank account. All this will have the affect of making sub post offices less viable. People like having the option of getting their pension paid at their local post office and should continue to have that option. This proposal will have a serious effect on pensioners especially those in rural areas and young people coming on to the job market, who either do not have bank accounts or do not wish to have them. The Parish Council has unanimously agreed to make representation to the Department of Work and Pensions and to Hugo Swire MP, objecting to this measure.

Uplyme Pre-School




