FOOD FOR THOUGHT.

How do you feel when you have been encouraged by another person, friend, boss, relation? Uplifted, revitalised, valued, increased self-esteem are some of the reactions we experience. At times when you feel low, dispirited or down hearted, it is often the word or actions of another that put you back on track.

Are you an encourager or a discourager? Do you bring joy when you enter a room, or do you bring joy when you leave the room? The word encouragement means to inspire, cheer, help, gee-up, give reassurance, security, or support. A phrase that could sum this up "is to come along side".

There is collective encouragement which may be used in team situations i.e. football players celebrating after scoring a goal, cheering of a crowd at an event etc. Also there is individual encouragement i.e. getting along-side a friend when they need support, making a meal, or shopping for a neighbour who is lonely, unwell. The list is endless. To be an encourager requires thoughtfulness, timing, and often giving of yourself. The impact on other people can be transforming, and in some cases life changing – you are showing you care and that the individual is valued.

Barnabas, the son of encouragement, is mentioned in the Bible in the book of Acts several times (see Acts ch.4 v.37; ch.9 v.26) where he was instrumental in supporting Paul after his conversion on the Damascus Road. As a result Paul went on to be a great missionary and was responsible for writing a number of books in the New Testament. Be encouraged – God can use anyone!

In society we need each other and it is important that we take opportunities and recognise when others we meet, know, need our encouragement – don't miss the opening when it comes!

News from Uplyme Village Shop and Post Office

A big thank you to everyone who supported the shop and Post Office over the Christmas period. Apologies if you had to wait a little longer than usual for the Post Office counter services, but we were certainly kept busy with what seemed like thousands of Christmas cards being sent to all corners of the earth and parcels to just about as many different destinations!

Just before Christmas our Customer Loyalty Card scheme was launched and many people have already claimed their rewards. If you haven't already got a card, please come into the shop and we will gladly explain how it works. The scheme was actually suggested by one of our customers!

The Post Office Paystation was installed in late November, and this now means that we are able to sell mobile telephone top-ups, recharge gas Quantum cards and electricity keys whenever the shop is open rather than only during normal Post Office opening times. As this article is being written, we are awaiting an engineer's arrival to upgrade the system so that it can deal with a much wider range of transactions and payment methods. Watch this space.

We receive regular deliveries of fresh fruit and vegetables from Cains Farm and Riverford, but you can also pre-order anything which you may particularly want. The first delivery of Seville oranges has just arrived for those who are keen on making marmalade.

Please remember that we are open in the evening until 7pm on Mondays to Saturdays for that bit of extra shopping to make your tea more enjoyable still!


SPICY BLACK GINGER BREAD

4 oz soft brown sugar
4 ozs margarine
6 oz plain flour
Pinch of salt
1 egg
1 level tspn bicarbonate of soda
2 oz black treacle
2 oz golden syrup
1 level tbspn ground ginger
1 and half level tspns ground cinnamon
1 cup milk

- 3 Pour into greased and lined 7" square tin or 2 lb loaf tin. Bake at 300 F, 150 C, Gas 2 for 1½ - 1¾ hours.

WELCOME TO THE REV. A.W.PARKE & MRS PARKE

The Rev. Alfred Watlington Parke was Rector of Uplyme for 36 years from 1883 to 1919. Grandson of the Rev. Charles Wicksted Ethelston, Mr Parke was much loved in the parish. Here is this somewhat verbose but touching account in *The Bridport News* of September 14th, 1883, of the arrival of Mr Parke and his wife, Hilda, in the village and their royal welcome to the Rectory, later to become the Devon Hotel and now Rohaise Court. The past is another country. Jack Thomas

It is not often that the quiet people of Uplyme exert themselves far beyond the general routine of life, but on Thursday evening they felt called upon to turn out in their best, and make a grand demonstration as a hearty welcome to their future rector. Many will remember years ago the kindly expression and good wishes that were made to this gentleman's mother when from the rectory the village folk gave her away in marriage, but not more appropriate or heartfelt than the welcome of her son back to the old residence to carry on the good work of his grandsire (the Rev. C.W.Ethelston) in obedience to "his last will and testament", and surely if the same spirit continues that greeted him on his arrival he must find it a pleasant duty. All the inhabitants of Uplyme seemed to have turned out to welcome the Rector. Early in the afternoon the bells of the old church tower rang merrily, and many willing hands were busily engaged in erecting triumphant arches across the street, and making the road to the rectory look gay with flowers and flags. Over the rectory door was a pretty festoon of ferns and choice flowers, and across the road was erected a high arch of flowers and ever-greens with the word in bold characters "WELCOME". Here a large number of people had assembled long before the happy pair had finished their journey by rail.

The school children were brought up in lines on each side of the way, the boys on one side, the girls on the other, each holding a bouquet of flowers while the band of the artillery volunteers played lively airs. About six o'clock the carriage and pair that had been sent from the "Cups" Hotel to fetch the reverend gentleman from the station was sighted and as it came up to the crowd a tremendous "hurrah" was given, while rice and the flowers carried by the children were all thrown into the carriage; the horses were taken out, ropes attached to the carriage and manned by a large num-

ber of ready hands, who with comparative ease, to the tune of "England's Heroes" conveyed the Rector to his new home. All along the route flowers were thrown into the carriage and on every hand they were greeted with a graceful bow or a pleasant smile. Outside the Rectory the road and the field above were thronged with people. Among those present we noticed Mrs H.Tucker, Miss Gifford, Miss Landon, Mrs and Miss Pullman, Mr. S.Fowler, Mr. Webb, Mr. Harrold, Mr. Tucker &c. On alighting at the door it was some time before the rev. gentleman could be heard to speak for the cheering. He said he did not know how to thank them for the kind and hearty reception they had just given him and his wife on their arrival. He may have thought of many things in connection with his coming to Uplyme, but he never thought of such a demonstration as this. He assured them that he could not find words to thank them as he would like for the kind greeting they had just given him; however, he hoped that the same kind feeling would continue and that he should remain with them long to enjoy it (cheers). As the Rector was about to retire, Mr H.Lanton asked him to say just a few words to the children, who had so kindly come out to meet him, that they might have something especially to remember. Mr Parke thanked Mr Lanton for reminding him, but said that he was at just a great a loss how to thank them for their kindness, and he was sure he did not know what his wife would do with all the flowers they had brought her. He hoped, however, that all the children would grow up as handsome as the "relics of Eden's bowers" which they had scattered so profusely at his feet. After bowing a graceful adieu, amid the continued cheering of a large crowd of people, the happy couple retired.

The Rev. A.W.Parke is from Henbury House, Wimborne, and his coming here as the rector has been looked forward to for years past. Our sincere wish is that he may live as long in the village and be as much respected as his late grandfather, the Rev.C.W.Ethelston.

OUT AND ABOUT WITH JOHN PENNINGTON

Happy New Year Out and Abouters!

I thought perhaps after a wet 2008 it was time for a holiday; nothing too tropical, and reasonably close to home? Read on:

The company I work for, Cisco Systems has its head office based at Bedfont Lakes near Heathrow in West London. It's a business park surrounded by housing, lakes, fields, woodland and Heathrow Airport - almost close enough to smell the aviation fuel! Whilst having lunch in the top floor restaurant recently, I looked out to the terrace (we can eat outside when weather permits) and perched on the edge of the building were two parakeets. A lovely shade of emerald green, they were chatting away to each other, totally oblivious to the many people several feet away from them behind large panes of glass. I watched them for ages, mesmerized by their beauty and thinking how surreal it was for a cold, but clear, December day. Parakeets are actually not rare in London, so many have escaped from their gardens that colonies have sprung up in several places. I have seen them before in Kew Gardens in the trees. Let's hope they survive the cold snap we have had over Christmas and into January.



Back to the office. The next day I looked out of the restaurant from the other side across to the largest lake. I often see geese and ducks, etc, but there to my amazement was a cormorant. I never realised they strayed from the sea, but apparently they are becoming more common on inland lakes. Things don't happen in twos to me! Later in the afternoon I was in a meeting on the ground floor that looked out to a small tree and tapping away was a greater spotted woodpecker. It was no more than ten feet from me and, like the parakeets, was oblivious to me. It must have been there for five minutes and during this time I watched it constantly, fortunately we were on a conference call so I did not need to look at anyone else !

It's great to know that well within earshot, and sometimes sniffing range, of the worlds busiest airport bird life is thriving. City and urban Nature reserves in the busiest areas are very important and usually have a fantastic range of species crammed in a small area.

Land at Clanbury, Rhode Lane. Erection of dwelling with new vehicular pedestrian access

Bulford, Lyme Road. Demolish existing dwelling and garage, construct replacement dwelling and garage.

Land to west of reservoir Shire Lane. Change of use of agricultural land to recreational land in connection with Woodroffe School.

Rosemundy, Lime Kiln Lane. Single storey extension to side of bungalow.

Applications dealt with by Planning Sub Committee

Warren Cottage, Harcombe. Erection of front and rear extensions and detached studio building. *The Parish Council recommends refusal of these inappropriate design additions to a traditional rural Devon long house. Not in accordance with Parish Council Guidelines. Any office/shed should have conditions stopping use as holiday or other accommodation.*

Saas-Fee, Whalley Lane. New Garage and ground floor shower extension. *The Parish Council has no objections to this application.*

Warren Cottage, Harcombe Amended Designs. Erection of front and rear extensions and detached studio building. *The Parish Council considers this cruciform design to be completely out of keeping in this rural area within an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The Parish Council would have no objection to the office/shed in lieu of containers, provided any accommodation, including holiday accommodation is prohibited.*


Parish Precept 2009/2010. The Clerk in his capacity as Responsible Financial Officer recommended an increase of £307 in the precept to £14,200. This allows for essential works to be carried out in Stafford mount and committed donations of £500 to King George Field, £200 to East Devon Citizens Advice Bureau and £250 to the Axe Valley & West Dorset Ring & Ride. The increase will result in an annual precept for a property in council tax Band D of £16.89 (an increase of 6p on the 2008/2009 precept). Councillors voted unanimously in favour of this increase.

Footpaths The Parish Council is about to carry out the annual survey of footpaths and bridleways. Any volunteers to help with this undertaking will be most welcome.

Emergency Procedures Although EDDC issue sandbags to the Parish Council these are not filled. The Parish Council is looking into ways in which sand can be stored and some bags prepared to cover any emergency in the event of flooding. Full details will be publicised in due course.




