

Mutual Encouragement

A favourite text which surfaced again in my thinking during my sabbatical 18 months ago, was Hebrews ch.10 vs.24,25: *“Let us consider how to stir up one another with love and good works, not neglecting to meet together as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another. And all the more, as we see the Day drawing near”*. At the time, as now even more so, it made me very thankful for the fellowship we enjoy at St. Peter and Paul’s Church, Uplyme. A lot of encouragement and mutual support is shared within the church family. Brethren are generous with their love and good works. Lyn and I are most grateful for the support we personally receive; and this has become all the more evident since I have become Rural Dean. Thank you!

Furthermore, we value the fact that Christian’s take seriously their responsibility before God to meet in order to encourage. I don’t believe it is possible to have a ‘virtual church’ where communication is limited to internet exchange. That firm hand shake and the discerning eye of compassion mean a great deal. As the text says, our meeting together is important. And it is not easy to maintain this in today’s social climate. Sunday has been de-sanctified and merged into the rest of the week as simply another day. So coming to church is to swim against the tide of our culture. It can be costly: Especially for our younger members.

I suspect that it is partly in this sense that the author of our text includes the words ... *“And all the more, as we see the Day drawing near”*. Of course, this is anticipating the Day of our Lord: When Jesus will come again and gather the Christian Church to Himself. (Lk.21:27,28) We are forewarned by Jesus to keep alert as time moves on towards this climactic event. (cf. Mtt.24 & 25) What God is saying to us in the Hebrews text is that we really don’t want to be alone at such a time as this. Christians essentially need each other in the fellowship of their local church family. In this way we will encourage one another and hold fast the Gospel of Jesus.

But of course, there are those who physically can’t manage to get to church. There are those who are homebound in old age and/or disability. They are valued members of the church family and they specially need the support and encouragement of those who can meet together. It is my experience that their ministry of prayer is vital and exemplary. One of the most important fields of ministry within the gathered church is that of Lay Visiting. If you would like to be involved in this, please contact Carole Fowkes (35884) who leads the group. For those who can’t come to church, the church must come to them.

Norman Taylor gave me some helpful meditations resulting from his research which bears upon this important subject.

Norman writes: “Good thoughts in Bad Times” was the name given by Revd. Dr. Thomas Fuller to a book he wrote in Exeter during the Civil War. Fuller was Vicar of Broadwindsor from 1634 to 1642. Then he went to be Curate of the Savoy Chapel in London, where he tried to promote reconciliation between King and Parliament; but, when this failed, he, being a Royalist, went to join King Charles 1 in Oxford. He became chaplain to Sir Ralph Hopton’s army, sharing with them in the battles in the West Country, and eventually joining the Royal Court in Exeter. After its surrender to

Cromwell's forces in 1646, he returned to London homeless and unemployed, and wrote (who can blame him?) "Good Thoughts in Worse Times".

Here is an exert for this month:

A Personal Meditation – Revd Dr. Thomas Fuller

Lord, thy servants are now praying in the church, and I am here staying at home, detained by necessary occasions, such as are not of my seeking, but of thy sending; my care could not prevent them, my power could not remove them. Wherefore, though I cannot go to church, there to sit down at table with the rest of thy guests, be pleased, and feed my soul with holy thoughts. Eldad and Medad*, though staying still in the camp (no doubt one just cause), yet prophesied as well as the other elders. Though they went not out to the spirit, the spirit came home to them. Thus never any dutiful child lost his legacy for being absent at the making of his father's will, if at the same time he were employed about his father's business. I fear too many at church have their bodies there, and minds at home. Behold, in exchange, my body here and heart there. Though I cannot pray with them, I pray for them. Yea, this comforts me, I am with thy congregation, because I would be with it. * cf. Numbers 11:26]

CHRISTIAN COUNTER CULTURE

Everyone is talking about a clash of cultures or a clash of civilisations. Before anyone had even heard about the Danish cartoons this was the subject the Rector had chosen to concentrate on for a series of discussion topics.

The Sermon on the Mount is about a clash of cultures. The culture of Jesus' own day and that of God's kingdom. Many of those who heard Jesus had their own ideas about what it would mean if the Kingdom really came, as indeed many do to-day. They thought that it would mean driving out the Romans. Jesus said 'No!' It means loving your enemies. It means praying for those who persecute you. Sadly, the Christian world has all too often ignored what Jesus had to say about what pleases our Father in heaven. Or if not ignored it has been very selective. The time has come when we need to look at the Sermon on the Mount with new eyes and to ask what it means for us now.

So for six Wednesday evenings beginning on 1 March Jeremy will be leading discussions in the lounge of the Black Dog.

An interesting talk with slides on a 'Rhine Cruise' was given by Miss A Paddy and she was warmly thanked by Mrs E Flett.



You don't have to be a practicing Christian to know that the world is in a mess and, if we are honest with ourselves, many of us know that our own lives need sorting out. The certainties with which many of us grew up no longer seem to apply. What we once believed was right we are now told is wrong and things we thought were wrong are now right. Some say that the loneliness and anxiety and broken relationships that trouble many are symptoms of a more fundamental broken relationship.

On ten Wednesday evenings at the Crealy Country Park beginning on Wednesday 26th April churches in Devon will be having a fresh look at the 10 commandments with J John, a leading Christian Communicator. J John is a Canon of Coventry Cathedral who has taken these presentations around Cathedrals and Universities. He has an unusual background – he is a Greek Cypriot (hence his name). This helps him to take a fresh look at this classic set of moral principles which many, whether churchgoers or not, still see as a basis for their own moral values. Working through the commandments in reverse order, the theme on the first evening will be “contentment” and on the second “truth”, the third “conscience”, the fourth “relationships”, the fifth “temper”, the sixth “parent/child issues”, the seventh “How to stop driving yourself crazy”, the eighth “How to take God seriously”, the ninth “How to know the real God” and on the tenth “How to live by priorities”.

Whether we consider ourselves as Christians, agnostics or non-believers we all need to rediscover the 10 Commandments which are not a set of rules to oppress us but are the keys to freedom. The Bishop of Exeter says “Ten years ago I had the privilege of being in Chester Cathedral as J John launched his Just 10 Mission. I saw a significant impact on the spiritual life of the DioceseI hope and pray that a similar renewal will grow here.”

Uplyme Church would encourage everyone in the village to try and get to at least one of these evenings, There will be a coach from Uplyme on 28th April. More details in April's Parish News.

Home Groups

Uplyme Church has two types of “home groups”

On some occasions we use the Alpha course and on others the Christianity Explored course.

We also run “bible discussion groups” for those already committed to Christ. One way of doing this is to meet informally with other Christians to read the Bible together and to learn to pray together. Mission Support Group

The Mission Support Group is a *small* group which meets *informally* about 4 times a year to coordinate “mission” activities. Its aim is to encourage people to look at the Christian way of life and come to know Jesus Christ. Members have been involved with

Alpha and Christianity Explored courses and run small groups to look at the bible.

The group is currently promoting an exciting initiative called *Just 10 Devon* – a series of multimedia presentations on the relevance of the 10 commandments in our lives today. The event which is to take place in a Big Top at Crealy Adventure Park on 10 Wednesday evenings (7.45pm-9.15pm) 26th April-28th June, is to be presented by *J John* one of the UK’s most relevant, incisive and thought provoking Christian communicators.

JUNIOR CHURCH-JC'S

Junior Church or the Jesus Christ Club, JC to all, takes place every 2nd, 4th and 5th Sunday of the month, during term time. It is run by a team of 7 committed members, who meet regularly to review the biblical content of the sessions, discuss future plans and provide support for each other. We are currently on the look out for an extra helper could that be you?

JC is open to all Primary and Junior school children up to the age of 11. Children are split into two age groups "Splash", for reception age to year 2, and "Xtreem" year 3 to year 6, which enables the children to be engaged at a level suitable to them. It is also our intention to start a group for 11+ youngsters on the 4th Sunday of the month.

Sessions start at 9.50 in Woodhaven, at Mrs Ethelstons School, with the children returning to church for the communion section of the service. They are then given the opportunity to share what they have been learning with the rest of the church family, before joining in with the final prayer and song. In the sessions themselves, we aim to help the children apply the Christian faith to their everyday lives our emphasis being, that God is there to help us wherever we are. This is achieved in a very relaxed atmosphere involving the singing of songs, playing of games, craft activities and learning about the bible in new and exciting ways. Every Tuesday evening at 6.45, for about half an hour, we meet in church when we pray about local, national and international issues, always seeking God's guidance for the way ahead for our own church community.

“Mellow Birds” is the name given to a group of mums with young children who meet weekly for fellowship and Bible studies.

The group was formed at the end of an Alpha course, held at Amherst Lodge in 2002, where it was decided that we would still like to meet together on a regular basis to study the Bible.

Here we are in 2006, we have a group that has grown in numbers and still meet together regularly to study the Bible.

The group meets weekly providing crèche facilities for pre-school children and Bible studies in a friendly and safe environment.

At this moment we have 20 or so mums in the group with a grand total in excess of 38 children. (I hasten to add, many of these children are of school age!) We have a most reliant and caring group of crèche volunteers who help out at 2 to 3 sessions per term. These helpers worship at various churches in the area. Without the valuable support of these helpers, the group would not be able to continue.

Each new term sees an exciting programme of Bible studies, guest speakers, social events and so on. Recently we have been studying Acts, which has been enjoyable and challenging.

We also encourage our “Men Folk” to get together for the occasional social. The group welcomes any new “Birds” whether a mum with young children or helpers for the crèche.

There have been two burglaries in the Rhode Lane area of Uplyme.

There is little information available at the moment although it does appear that the properties were chosen because their occupants were away on holiday. In one case entry was gained through a rear window which was forced open without breakage of glass. Jewellery was among the items stolen. On leaving, ornaments were carefully replaced and the window closed to give the impression that nothing untoward had happened. Even the cleaner on a regular visit did not know.

This is not the first instance of a 'careful' burglar who leaves little trace of his presence.

The best advice is to regularly check little used doors and windows for security, and try to avoid making it obvious your property is unoccupied.

If the police issue any further information, I will let you know.

Recent update: Burglars have broken into yet another house and shed at Rhode Hill, a week after the other Rhode Lane burglaries.

Report on Uplyme Parish Council Monthly Meeting held on 8th February 2006

Planning

Applications Granted by East Devon District Council

Highdown, Lime Kiln Lane Two storey extension.

Orchard End (formerly White Cottage), Ware Lane. Extension and erection of car port.

Hartgrove House, Trinity Hill Road. Extension to house including new garage.

Hook Farm Camping & Caravan site. Replacement building to provide reception and shop and widening of internal access road.

Applications considered

Hook Farm Camping & Caravan site. Replacement building to provide reception and shop and widening of internal access road. No objections. Recommended.

The Downs, Woodhouse Hill. Retention of an erected fence. The Parish Council considers this stock proof fence to be extremely ugly and built in a way which is totally inappropriate for this Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty . Refusal Recommended.

Streamwood, St Mary's Lane, Yawl Cross. New entrance and timber deck. The Parish Council is unanimous in recommending rejection of this plan. This is a beautiful natural woodland area in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty which needs to be managed and not developed. The decking is totally inappropriate and would lead to urbanisation. Not Recommended.

The Old Chapel, Rocombe. Erection of two storey extension and porch. No objections. Recommended.

Parish Precept 2006/2007

The Clerk reported as follows:- Two major factors make it necessary for the precept to be increased from £8,200 for the current year to £12,726 (an increase of £4,526) for the coming year. The maintenance contract will cost £5,780 which is an increase of £2,902 on the previous year. Cemetery fees are considerably down on previous years. Income for the current year is estimated at £1,000 whereas in previous years it has been in the region of £3,000 (this will result in an overall deficit for the current year of just short of £2,000). One can only make an educated guess at what the income will be for the coming year, but prudence would suggest that it will be no more than the current year. This means a drop in income of £2,000. Taking these two factors together it can be seen why this increase is necessary. Had it not been for these two factors then the precept could have been kept to the same level as last year. A precept of £12,726 would result in a precept for a property in council tax Band D as follows:-

Per Week (52 weeks)	£ 0.30	£ 0.20	£0.10

What also should be borne in mind is the question of Parish Councillors' Allowances. Since these were brought into force the Parish Council has elected not to make any claim. Should it have done so then for the coming year each councillor would be entitled to claim £275 and the Chairman £392. In total this would amount to £2867 which if claimed would mean an even greater increase in the precept.

Councillors voted unanimously in favour of the recommended precept.

A RECIPE FROM NEW ZEALAND

Apple pie with a cheese crust.

4 ozs plain flour

4 ozs S R flour

2 tbsps castor sugar

4 ozs butter

2 ozs grated tasty cheese

Water to mix to a firm dough.

1 Put flours and sugar into bowl, rub in butter, add cheese and water to make a firm dough.

2 Press pastry into a ball and refrigerate for 30 minutes.

3 Roll out and line a flan tin (23 cm), cover base with greaseproof paper and dried beans.

4 Bake in moderately hot oven 220 - 230 degrees for 7 minutes, remove paper and beans, bake further 7 minutes - cool.

5 While pastry is cooking, make filling

4 large Granny Smith Apples, or similar

1 tbspn lemon juice

4 oz sugar

Qtr tspn cinnamon

1 Chop apples coarsely and cook with lemon juice until just tender, stir in flour, sugar and cinnamon and cool to room temperature

2 Place filling in pastry case and sprinkle with topping :

Topping

3 ozs brown sugar

2 ozs plain flour

2 ozs coarsely chopped pecan nuts

2 ozs butter

1 Put sugar, flour and pecans in bowl, rub in butter until mixture is coarse and crumbly.

2 Put on top of apples, bake in moderately hot oven for 15 minutes, reduce heat for further 15 minutes

3 Cool to room temperature and serve with cream.
