

## MORE TEA VICAR?



I often hear people summarise Christianity with the phrase, **“Do unto others as you would have them do to you.”** - a teaching of Jesus that is lifted straight out of the Bible from Luke 6:31. Some of these people assert that as long as they do this, well, there’s no need for religion, a church community, Sunday worship, and so on. However, there is a danger in this because if you seek to live by that phrase alone then the way you see others becomes dependent on how you see yourself. At its best it can lead to wonderful generosity of heart, physical blessing and strong community. At its worst it can lead to a dog-eat-dog selfishness based on our needs and our wants.

**The point of Jesus’ teaching is that we should treat others based on how God sees them and not how we see them.**

I was on a conference recently and as the speaker was talking he quoted a phrase from a Christian church worker who lived in the 14th Century. Her name was Catherine of Seina and she said something very simple but very profound, “He loved us within himself before he created us.” In other words, we existed as an idea in God before we were created. I love that and it’s worth stopping and spending just a few seconds to think about it. He loved us within himself before he created us. To me, it speaks of the preciousness of every person to God.

At Uplyme Church we have some values – you can read them on our web-site. One of those values is this:

- Everyone is a child of God, irrespective of age, gender, tradition, sexuality, physical or mental ability, and we aim to provide pastoral care that upholds the essential dignity of every individual.

Those words ‘essential dignity’ means that there is something special in everyone and that special thing is that they were an idea in God before they were created – divinely precious and supremely loved.

Can you imagine a community where we see each other like that? Wouldn’t you want to be part of that? Wouldn’t it be amazing to live in a community where people see you as God sees you? Well, that is something we are trying to embody through Uplyme Church.

So, this month, may you know God’s blessing. May you know you were an idea in God before you were made. And may you truly treat others as you would have them treat you.

Amen.

## Priming the pump – ABC of Uplyme’s water and sanitation project



**J – Jerrycan** : 2.5 million people in the world currently don't have access to a safe toilet or clean water. As a community we are seeking to do something about this by supporting a project run by BICC and overseen by Tearfund to provide clean water and sanitation to villages in the Choma area of Southern Zambia. For many people currently, water is collected by 20 litre jerrycans from waterholes which are frequented by animals. It is the job of women and girls to do this, boys tend to look after the animals. Walking to a remote areas make this a hazardous task, with many girls running the risk of attack. The project is seeking to raise money to provide boreholes in local villages, at a place decided upon by the villagers themselves (subject to geological survey). **K – Kwacha** : The currency of Zambia is Kwachas. 1 Kwacha is broken down into 100 Ngwees. A British pound is worth around 8040.60 Kwachas. The cost of living in Lusaka is average. 1kg of bread costs around 80p. However most people who live in rural areas, live in poverty. Communities with access to boreholes find that time saved not having to walk 2 miles for water, enables more work to be done. More crops can be grown changing subsistence farming to income generating farming, thus improving not just health but enabling people to become more self-sufficient.

**L – Language** : English is the official language of Zambia which is great for us as it makes communication so much easier. Bemba, Lozi, Nyanja and Tonga are the main languages spoken alongside English.



**M – Money** : Inside your Parish News there is an envelope should you wish to give a donation to this project this harvest time. These can be put into the church mailbox or left with Neil at the village shop. We are seeking to raise enough money to pay for two boreholes in Zambia this year and anything you can give will be very gratefully received. If you can gift aid the money to enable us to claim the tax back; that will make your gift worth 25% more. Thank you for all your support for this project. ## Out and about with John Pennington

As is often the case in September, just as the children are back at school, the weather suddenly improves and we have an Indian summer! September is my favourite month (*I may well have mentioned this in a historical episode of Out and About?*) I just love the colours as the leaves start to turn brown. Its a perfect time of year for my favourite sport, cycling, which I unfortunately I cannot do for a month or set yet, due to my fall at the end of June.



At the weekend I took the family to Dartmoor to watch the 'Tour of Britain' cyclists go over the moor. The weather was superb and we parked ourselves half way up a steep hill in order to watch the professional cyclists at their slowest. The slope was similar to Sidmouth Road out of Lyme Regis and when the peleton arrived they went past at about 10mph! I've never seen such crowds in the UK for a cycle race and it's no doubt a result of the Olympics and Bradley Wiggins success in the 'Tour De France'. Even better, the next day the race was won outright by a rider from Devon, Jon Tiernen Locke, despite competition from some of the worlds best riders in the race.

Now, the reason I'm telling you all this is simple - Cycling is extremely good for you and the best way of seeing local scenery. If you avoid the main road and stick to Uplyme's numerous country lanes or bridleways, there are far fewer cars and fabulous views. For anyone who says, "the hills are too steep", there is a solution. Electrically assisted bikes are now extremely good and don't cost a fortune (far less that a car or motorbike/scooter). I've seen several around and about Lyme Regis recently after buying one for my wife last year. Earlier in the year we cycled to Seaton together and on the way home headed up Steppes Lane out of Axmouth - a very steep accent. I could not keep up on my racing bike and at the top Sam was not even puffing (and I certainly was!). The best thing about these bikes is you still have to peddle, but the motor just helps you out. I've seen the Parish News editor out on his bike recently (without a motor) and if he can get on a bike anyone can!

## IN MEMORY OF PHILIPPA CORBIN

In a matter of fourteen months Uplyme has witnessed the bewildering and tragic deaths of Philippa Corbin and William Booth. Both were lovely young people who were kind, giving, devoted and pivotal to their families and friends. Both were not themselves the moment they made the irreversible decision they did. Both were suffering from the pain of the illness depression.

The incidence of depression is very much more widespread than is generally realised and it is a major cause of death particularly amongst young people. Many of these deaths could be avoided if recognition of the illness and suitable treatment was more readily accessible. We want to help people suffering from depression and their families; to see the amber light before the red.

**SLOW RIDE TO TURIN** is Maddy's way to pay homage to her sister and all that she achieved in her life, and to celebrate the things she loved. Pip would head for the biennial Slow Food Festival whenever time or money allowed where she would whip up her eternal enthusiasm for anything that made her heart race. Twenty-eight cyclists plus support team of four, will leave Axminster on 13<sup>th</sup> October to cycle nearly 800 miles to Turin for the opening of The Food Festival on the 25<sup>th</sup> October. As well as raising an awareness of depression as an illness, the aim of the ride is to raise money for two charities, both of which work to help people who are suffering from depression in different ways.



## In the Garden with Nigel Ball


After a mixed season in the garden and on the allotment this year, there are plants that have done well and others that have not, but there is always another year as they say. Perhaps the readers would like to share their views in the next issue of the parish magazine? Just email me at [nigelball3@btinternet.com](mailto:nigelball3@btinternet.com). We could have a section on good varieties to grow and varieties that have not performed as you thought they would? "Over to you". As always I split my notes into sections for things to do in the coming month so here we go and have a good read.

### Things to do in the vegetable garden

- Plant spring cabbage and late leeks.
- Continue to harvest carrots and keep some to store.
- Stake sprout plants if needed to prevent wind rock.
- Take down bean canes and store in a dry place.
- Take note what has done well or not as the case may be.

### Things to do in the flower garden

- Dahlia tubers can be dug up and stored in a dry and frost free place.
- Do not cut down perennial plants until first frost.
- Now is time to divide perennials and re-organise flower borders .
- Plant new plants in those spaces you have marked.
- If there is a new plant you want, swap with someone or put it on your birthday list.



### Things to do in the Fruit garden

- Tie in [if not already done] new shoots on loganberries, blackberries and tayberries.
- Remove old stems from summer fruiting raspberries and tie in new shoots.
- Pick in late fruit for keeping only keep top quality fruit.
- Rake up leaves and debris around all fruit bushes "hygiene" is vital at this time of year.
- Plant new fruit trees this month.

### Things to do think about in the coming months.

- Think about next year do you want to make changes to your garden?
- Christmas is coming what present would be useful for your garden?
- Decorate you garden for the winter using winter flowering plants in pots to brighten your day.
- Do not forget those paths around your house they get very slippery! Also check gutters and down pipes for blockages.
- Above all enjoy your garden get out on the good days and reflect on your achievements on bad days.

### Police and Crime Commissioner Elections...

Elections for the new position will be held on **Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> November**, but what will the new Commissioner do?

The role of the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) will not be to run the Police, but is intended to be our voice in holding the Police to account. The PCC will hold the budget for Policing and release funds to the Chief Constable, so whoever is elected to the position will have a great influence over how our area is policed.

### Government relaxes UK Planning Laws for Extensions...

In a bid to speed up economic growth, the Government has announced a relaxation in planning rules. They seek to allow the building of larger extensions under varied 'permitted development rights' up to 8metres long, under some circumstances, without the need for planning permission.

Larger extensions will still be subject to Building Regulations. Recognizing typically 95% of EDDC planning applications are approved, within the eight week period required. Will this make a real difference to our economy? Or is there risk a flurry of larger extensions which, whilst they may previously have been declined for good planning reasons, can now be built without that prudent safeguard?

What do you think?

### Planning Rules relaxed for Broadband...

Anyone who has followed TM articles over the last eighteen months will recognise that failure to deploy Superfast Broadband in our area has nothing to do with EDDC administration of our planning system.

Yet Central Government has announced a relaxation which could mean that Broadband Street Cabinets can be installed anywhere, without the need for Local Council approval. Broadband fibre and other infrastructure can be placed under or above private land, and overhead lines installed without the need for planning or other permission.

Missing the mark?...this is a problem I wish we had... we have no Superfast Broadband infrastructure here!....

### BT Upgrade Lyme Regis Exchange...

On a positive note...the authoritative 'Samknows.com' is showing an RFS (Ready for Service to the rest of us) date of **30<sup>th</sup> September 2012** (brought forward recently from 31<sup>st</sup> October). But what does this actually mean?

### Is this the new Superfast Broadband service we see all the adverts for on TV?

**No** - the 21CN (21st Century Network) service is still based on the copper wire between the Lyme Regis exchange and our properties (business and residential). We should not expect a rush of young

South American ladies knocking on our door, wanting to contact their boyfriends at home (see current BT advert programme, which does not relate to this service).

### **Does this mean that BT will be offering a better service locally?**

#### **Yes and No...**

**Yes** - Existing BT customers should be able to secure an upgrade in their service from 'Up to 8Mb' under the existing archaic system to 'Up to 24Mb'. The 24Mb will only be achieved on the doorstep of the exchange and the benefit falls away swiftly with distance, such that remote premises should expect little benefit.

**and No...** This is no improvement over the services already offered by Sky (Easynet) and Talk Talk from Lyme Regis exchange. It is merely BT catching up with the local competition.

## Notes from the monthly Council meeting, 13<sup>th</sup> September 2012

**Floods:** The Council working party has been very busy for the past 2 months collecting information and contacting various statutory bodies and local landowners affected by the flooding, and is investigating small alleviation schemes as well as a long-term solution. The Trustees of King George's Field are very concerned that any future heavy rain will again flood the tennis courts which are their only source of income, and if this danger is not alleviated, the field will have to close, to the detriment of all local users of the facilities. The Trustees have requested the Council to consider immediately reinstating the previously-proposed scheme with improvements, but this request came too late for a decision to be made at the meeting. The Council is unwilling to commit to spending taxpayers' money on a scheme that it is not convinced will be adequate, without getting expert advice on the engineering aspects, but is very aware of the need to get something done as soon as possible.

### Planning:

#### Applications dealt with at meeting:

- **East Marches Launchcroft** Variation of condition of planning permission 01/P0797 to allow use as ancillary accommodation or holiday let. *The Parish Council objects to this application.*

#### Responses ratified at meeting:

- **Land North West Of Yawl Hill Lane** Retention of access track for agricultural purposes. *The Parish Council strongly objects to this application. (An attached letter gave detailed reasons for objection.)*
- **The Old Black Dog Lyme Road** Change of use of part of guest house to tea room. *The Parish Council strongly supports this application.*
- **14 Glebelands** Raised deck and steps. *The Parish Council does not object to this application.*
- **Land Adjacent Lydwell House Lyme Road** Renewal of extant planning permission 09/0885/FUL for the construction of 2no. detached dwellings and associated garaging. *The Parish Council objects to this application, which is in breach of several conditions of the original application.*
- **Uplyme Cricket Club King George's Playing Field Lyme Road T1 & T2** Sugar Maple: Lift crown to give 3m clearance making pruning cuts of 3cm diameter maximum. Reduce end weight on overextended branches. T7 & T10: Reduce extended branches throughout canopy by 5-6m, target pruning cuts max 15cm diameter. *Given the reduced scope of this scheme compared to 12/1310/TRE, the Parish Council has no objections to this revised application.*

Councillors were dismayed to hear that this application was turned down and the Clerk will write to EDDC.

- **Carnbrae (land To The Rear Of) Woodhouse Hill** Extension to existing barn and installation of pv panels *Approved with conditions*

- **Fair View Gore Lane** Proposed front extension to create a split level bungalow & Erect a carport to the side of the new extension *Approved with conditions*
- **The Old Dairy House Rhode Lane** Variation of conditions 5 and 7 of permission 05/3162/FUL to allow use of timber in lieu of stonework and relocation of one rooflight. *Approved with conditions*
- **7 Glebelands** Retention of outbuilding *Refused*
- **Land adjoining Gore Lane** Construction of dwelling and improvements to access *Refused*
- **Land West Of Buckthorn Harcombe Road** Construction of dwelling (Outline Application with all other matters reserved except access). *Refused*
- **14 Glebelands** Raised deck and steps *Approved*

**New Councillor:** David Ostler was co-opted onto the Council to fill the vacancy – welcome! The Council wishes to thank Paula Brittles and Patricia Riley for asking to be considered, and was gratified at the interest they showed in the position – it was a difficult decision but only one person could be co-opted.

**Police:** Since July, PCSO Wooster reports an unauthorised taking of a motor vehicle: offender was dealt with by way of restorative justice; and that a trailer was stolen from Harcombe, and enquiries are ongoing. Acting Sgt Stephen Paynter has replaced Sgt Peter Trudgeon for approximately six months. He will be covering both Axminster and Seaton Police Stations. The old non-emergency number has been disconnected, so telephone 101 for all enquiries.

**Cemetery fees:** these are reviewed annually. Last year, they were left at the same rate to alleviate hardship, but are now very much lower than adjoining cemeteries, and the Council has agreed to increase them, although they will still be much less than, for example, Axminster or the EDDC cemeteries including Seaton. Full details available from the Clerk or on the Council web site.

**Affordable Housing:** the name and postcode have now been allocated:

1 – 8 Masters Close, Uplyme, Lyme Regis DT7 3XN.

Surface water drainage to the stream is nearly complete. The two base slabs are completed and work on them will be proceeding. There are still problems with a patch of greensand near the site entrance (Cooks Mead Roundabout) and discussions are in hand with the Highways Department, who will eventually take over the roadwork over this area.
