

Yes, you will need to be a bit brave to walk through that door but I promise that we will do our best to assure of you of God's love and make you feel right at home.

## WHAT IS OUR WORSHIP LIKE?

If you've never joined us for worship at Uplyme Church, let me tell you what it's like...

At the moment we have two worship gatherings every Sunday. We have a **10am worship** and a **6pm worship**.

**10am is Family Worship.** Every week (apart from major festivals) there is Junior Church in the school for children aged 3+ and a group for young people up to the age of 16. Inside the church building we have a gallery and there are some comfy sofas and toys for parents and carers with babies and children under the age of 3. The worship is an hour long and the children and young people are brought back into the building at 11am. If there is a communion we spend an extra 15 minutes with everyone all together doing the communion thing. The worship is projector led – i.e. all the words are up on the screen and we sing a mixture of contemporary and traditional songs and hymns. Some of these are led by a band, sometimes the organ is used, and every so often we have one of our contemporary choirs singing something lovely. The worship is often led by a member of the congregation and other members lead the prayers and read the Bible reading. We do our best to have a short and relevant talk in there too. After worship just about everyone stays afterwards for a chat and a biccie washed down with coffee, tea or squash. We also have people who are ready and willing to pray with those who need prayer. They are up in the chancel (the end of the church). There are up to 90 adults of all ages and 40 children and young people that come along. There are always new people and visitors too.

**6pm is Evening Worship.** This is a quieter worship that is more contemplative and meditative. We use (from 27th November 2011) a special Uplyme Church worship booklet that follows the rhythm of the Christian year with its rich tapestry of themes and images. Within an atmosphere of quiet and reflection, we use texts from a range of traditions within the Christian Church. Where possible, we have tried to make the liturgy more participatory through the use of congregational prayers and responses, and employ times of silence for personal reflection and prayer. We sing a few hymns on the organ and there is a short but relevant talk. There are up to 40 adults that come along. I think we might have to start doing coffee after this worship too!

**Brownies** After 14 years in guiding, the last 9 of which have been in Uplyme, I am finally stepping down at Christmas. In my time here, there have been a great number of people who have helped ensure that Uplyme has a thriving Brownie unit, in particular, Penny Randerson, Heather Pullinger, Ingrid Holland, Tessa Prescott and Cathy Summers, who still audits our books for us today. Thank you all. I especially want to thank Heather Pullinger for years of dedication. Along side Penny and myself we enjoyed years of brilliant team work, each of us with our own area of skills. Heather joined the unit in 2003 and even when she could no longer make meetings she has continued to keep our books and help with admin to this day. She will also be stepping down soon.

During my time at Uplyme, Brownies have raised over £2,000 for the tsunami appeal, and supported many national charities such as the RNLI, Air Ambulance, Shelter Box, RNIB, and The Childrens' Hospice SW. The guiding organisation encourages girls to be involved in the local community and Uplyme does so in many small ways from being on the flower rota at church and being involved in the village fete to taking part in Remembrance Day and carol singing at the old peoples' home. We've celebrated 90 years of Brownies and 100 years of the Girl Guide Association, been on various pack holidays and days out and generally covered badges from writers' and artists' to disability awareness and science investigator. It has been a great pleasure working with the girls and I wish Donna and Claire as much enjoyment as I have had.

This term Donna and Claire have been gradually taking over the reigns of running our unit. The girls have been working on their 'seasons' badge, visiting Goran wild flower farm, baking apple & damson pies and star gazing. Brownies took part in the Remembrance service at Uplyme Church, well done, everyone was smart and well behaved. We've also made up some shoe boxes for the Samaritans' Purse, Christmas Child Appeal, numbers are not known as yet, as this was ongoing at the time of printing.

This year we will be singing carols at two venues; the Uplyme Church Fayre on Dec 3rd, instead of running a stall and we will have our final meeting for the year at Pinhay Residential Home where everyone joins us in the carol singing.

Happy Christmas from all at Uplyme Brownies.





## OUT AND ABOUT WITH JOHN PENNINGTON

Weather is a topic with which the British as a race are obsessed about. We'll usually greet each other with a comment about how hot or cold it is, so I thought this month I'd discuss the weather which has been a little out of sync of late. By the time you read this, winter is probably finally here after a very mild autumn. I went swimming in the sea with my children on the 1st October and can honestly say the water was warmer than in August! It is also the first year I have not turned my heating on until well into November - normally the boiler gets ignited sometime in September. Such extremes of temperature seem to be happening more and more. The UK climate is unpredictable at the best of times, but the last few years have been interesting to say the least.

I wonder whether anyone in Uplyme keeps weather records? It would be very interesting to find out the highs and lows in temperature during the last few decades. When I was a teenager (*I've got one of my own now so it was a few years ago*) we had a Stevenson screen in the garden which contained a couple of thermometers and a thermo-hygrograph for measuring relative humidity. The idea of the Stevenson screen is to give a stabilized environment to accurately record temperature in the shade. They are always white to reflect any solar radiation and should be placed in the open. The one thing I clearly remember is the fact that the humidity was normally 90% or more; which is not actually that surprising given that Timber Hill is not far from the sea. I was always scampering into the garden to check the temperature on cold mornings to see how many degrees below freezing it had been the night before.



We also had a rain gauge which was even more fun - how many inches had it rained in 24 hours? The interesting thing about a rain gauge is that it has to have a sharp side to give an accurate reading. Rain drops need to be cut in half to give a precise figure - or at least that's what I was told.

Finally, today is a very grey one and about the only brightness when looking out of our house are the two Echinium plants in the photo. These have the most amazing purple flowers in their second year - up to 10 feet tall and covered in bees on a sunny day. The only problem is if we have another very cold winter they won't last and its third time lucky for Mrs P who carefully sows some seeds each spring!

## Tributes for Terry Daly



### Nick Daly

My Dad liked to try new things, so here I am today doing something new.

Most of you will know that he grew up in the hard but fair north and I think that when he moved south he lost most of the hard but kept the fair. Like Dad, I grew to love the long winter walks which soon became an annual holiday which we enjoyed for many years. Our second and last home as a family together was a very big semi which soon satisfied Dad's passion for building projects. Memories here were the lack of heating and going to bed with clothes and duffel coats on and the beautiful frost patterns on the windows. One day I came in from playing in the streets and there was something odd happening in the house. My father's head ap-

peared and he said "you've got a baby sister." ~Crumbs, I thought, how did that happen? Not long after a similar day occurred "you've got a new baby brother." So now there was Lisa and I and Kate and Matthew. It must have been a real trial for Mum and Dad bringing up four children from two different age groups, but we think they managed very well. I became fascinated with his architectural drawings and plans and the occasional paintings which were being worked on in the attic. Dad taught me the basics of Town Planning and I noticed that the plans and artistic impressions were beginning to have a certain character of their own. After retirement, painting and drawing became prevalent and it was interesting to see how good his paintings looked together at his exhibitions. Dad's most prolific artistic work was in Uplyme.

Which brings me to the first look at Woodhouse Cottage – there was not much roof and a strong aroma of charred timber! Dad's friends and family all lent a hand or two and at the end of one day's work, my father asked me to turn the gas on and there was a noise like a cartoon sound effect and running to see if he was alright, burst into laughter because he was standing there with a Nelson Mandela-style grey hairdo with eyebrows to match! However, I was soon forgiven and that was a strong aspect of his character, along with patience, helping others, not being hasty in judging people and having a positive outlook on life.

### **The Rev'd Barry Grimster Team Rector of the South Woking Team Ministry.**

Terry knew me as a child at Holy Trinity Church, Hove where our parents were friends. I began to know him when I was 13 and first attended our church Youth Fellowship camp. I was a spotty, self-conscious school boy and Terry was one of the first to welcome me and put me at my ease. He was ever a gentle giant. After that camp I was hungry for more of the "fellowship" I had tasted, with Jesus Christ at its centre. Terry and Sue used to meet after the Sunday evening service and there we shared with others, Bible study and open prayer. When I got my results for O Levels, Terry and Sue gave me a book token for 10/6 and I spent it on a Bible which Terry inscribed quoting from 1 Corinthians C13 V8 "Love never ends...." I have underlined that verse in all my Bibles since that day. In my teen years I began to think that the Lord was calling me into the ordained ministry and Terry was one of my referees and he and Sue were there to support me at my ordination in Southwark Cathedral in 1974. When Terry and Sue moved to Uplyme they generously made Woodhouse Cottage available for our family for an annual summer holiday. In my youth Terry and Sue virtually adopted me as a fifth member of their delightful family – I became an honorary Daly! And I am deeply indebted to them for their

love, prayer and the endless hours they gave me....Terry was a father in Christ to me. As CS Lewis said "Christians never say goodbye!". I believe that by the grace of God in Jesus Christ, I shall see Terry again when we shall realise the fruition of our hope in the living God, and rejoice for ever in the love of God in Christ, the "love that never ends...."

### **David Dare**

Well Sue, Nick, Lisa, Kate and Matthew and your families! I believe I speak for all of us here who knew Terry well when I say that just thinking of him brings joy to our hearts and inspiration to our minds. Eighteen years ago he and Sue purchased a burned-out roofless ruin in Uplyme. It took four years to transform it into a cosy family home. Over all these years, Terry became much loved with his humility, gentleness and patience. He was unhurried and most approachable, with a lovely sense of humour and endearing chuckle. He was a treasure of patience and wisdom in the various roles he performed in his family, Uplyme church and community over the years. He always encouraged us to grasp how Christ's love for us all is "wide and long and high and deep" Terry had absolutely no doubt about where he was going. During his final days, I truly believe that Terry was particularly able to identify with Christ's suffering for us all on the cross. He had the assurance and peace of God's forgiveness. We thank God for sharing Terry with us – just thinking of him brings joy to our hearts and inspiration to our minds.

### **Peter Dench**

Pat and I met Terry at the first meeting of a local group who were interested in the Parish Plan for Uplyme. It soon became obvious that he had been involved in Town Planning and understood "Council Speak" and was elected Chairman. The idea was to plan the next ten years of development in the Parish. His gentle prompting drew together a vision of a new centre using a new school as the catalyst. This is an example of his foresight. To help the limited budget the meetings were arranged at The Old Black Dog. After the meetings Pat and I chatted about how we were seeking to gain experience of local facilities to recommend to our guests. These developed into Terry and Sue asking to "Tag Along" and we had many "Tag Alongs" and a lot of fun.

Terry often sat in pubs and cafes sketching other customers and he must have been the scourge of the Brighton to Victoria line during his commuting days! We learned that he was a dedicated member of the church and at that time was Church Warden. He was also the artist for the Parish Magazine cover.....which as many will know, tells a story with the changing of seasons.

Terry achieved so much by modest nudges, he was a catalyst, an enabler and networker. He helped people to do things. i.e The Writing Group, the 8 to 80 Breakfasts. The list is much much larger. He needed more time for all this – the gap he leaves will be difficult to fill. For us the greatest outcome of the Parish Plan was our friendship with Sue and Terry.

### **Chicken with Mediterranean Flavours**

4 chicken breasts  
For the marinade:  
2 olives – chopped  
Juice of large orange and lemon  
2 teaspoons balsamic vinegar

Large red onion sliced  
4 garlic cloves chopped  
4 sun dried tomatoes chopped  
1 red chilli chopped  
6oz aubergine chopped  
2tbs raisins and capers  
1 red and 1 yellow pepper peeled and cut into strips  
½ pint stock  
½ pint dry white wine  
Salt and pepper



1. Mix the marinade ingredients and pour over chicken in a dish, leave 2-3 hours
2. Put rest of ingredients in lightly oiled pan, cover and simmer for 5-7 minutes. Uncover and continue to simmer until tender.
3. Lightly oil a grill pan, shake marinade off the chicken and grill for 2-3 minutes each side.
4. Lay chicken in one layer on vegetables in the pan, cover and simmer gently, turning, for 7-8 minutes until cooked.

## **A New, Faster Broadband is Coming Our Way?...**

Rural areas in the Axmouth – Dunkeswell arc, which includes some of the country areas of Uplyme Parish, currently receives little or no broadband service. They will now be able to receive a new speedier service, with the benefit of financial support.

Details have not yet been announced, but a satellite based solution has been suggested for those at the extreme of expected future network coverage, through funding won by Devon and Somerset. Speeds of up to 10Mb are achievable.

My concern is that the projected costs, (significantly greater than those for comparable services elsewhere), will perpetuate the structural rural disadvantage, and compromise the ability of our local economy to take advantage of the opportunities Next Generation Broadband offers. Our Trinity Broadband group will be working with DCC to ensure the best possible deal for remote Trinity residents and businesses.

## **Whitehall announces a Shift of Power to local Communities...**

The Department for Communities and Local Government has confirmed that Royal Assent of the Localism Bill to herald a shift of power from Whitehall to communities.

Central Government intends that a raft of new rights and powers are put at the disposal of local people to take charge of our future, with the coalition delivering on more than 30 commitments.

### **Localism Bill becomes law;**

The Localism act will trigger the biggest transfer of power in a generation, releasing councils and communities from the grip of central government.

Yet this is taking place at a time of sweeping cuts in Local Authority budgets. My personal view is that we must look to Central Government to ensure that **proper funding moves with responsibility**, to ensure that we can decisively deliver on new opportunities, and reflect the wishes of our communities most effectively....

### **Key measures to increase the power of local government through the Act:**

- Councils are now free to do anything - provided they do not break other laws
- Clarifying the rules on predetermination in order to free up councillors to express their opinions
- Giving councils greater control over business rates.

- Introducing new planning enforcement rules.
- Increasing powers for councils to remove illegal advertisements.
- Allowing councils to keep the rent they collect

### **Key measures to increase the power of local communities include:**

- Introducing a new Right to Bid, which will give residents the opportunity to take over treasured local assets like shops and pubs and keep them part of local life.
- Introducing a new Right to Challenge.
- Increasing transparency on local pay, by requiring councils to publish the salaries of senior officials
- Giving communities the right to veto excess council tax rises.
- Introducing a new right to draw up a Neighbourhood Plan.
- Freeing home sellers and buyers from red tape through the abolition of Home Information Packs.
- Giving social tenants stronger tools to hold their landlords to account.
- Requiring developers to consult local communities before submitting certain applications.

## Notes from the monthly Council meeting, 9th November 2011

At the open forum, issues including the vandalism of the bus stop seats at Stafford Mount and the Talbot Arms, the poor state of the Stafford Mount gardens, and the difficulty of hearing proceedings when the hall heating was on were discussed.

### Planning: Applications already dealt with since last meeting

- **Holly Hill Bungalow Springhead.** Alterations and extensions to include garage/workshop, extensions to roof, rear balcony/terrace, dormer windows, porch extension, replacement of car port with oil tank and log store to east of dwelling. The Parish Council does not object to this application.

### Applications dealt with at the meeting

- **Newcastle Cottage Woodhouse Lane.** Construction of side and rear extension. (normal and LBC applications). The plans have no proper scales. The PC does not object to this application.
- **Post Office Lyme Road.** Demolition of existing single span storey shop unit to facilitate construction of 2 storey residential units. The PC recommends that the site has one dwelling only, with a reduced height, and a footpath at the front.

### Applications granted by EDDC since last meeting

- **Tree Tops Lime Kiln Lane.** Construction of two storey glazed rear extension and installation of solar panels on roof of garage. Granted with conditions
- **Lymewood Retirement Home Lyme Road.** Variation of condition 4 of permission 06/0855/FUL to enable roofspace to be used as office and occasional sleep over facility including insertion of rooflights and removal of ground floor windows. Granted with conditions
- **Land At Lower Coombe Wadley Hill.** Removal of hedge. Granted
- Readers can look at [www.uplymeparishcouncil.org](http://www.uplymeparishcouncil.org) for full details of these decisions, which are published in the Minutes section after approval by the Council, and also displayed on the PC noticeboards.

**Other planning:** Cllr Whiting summarised the affordable housing timetable – currently scheduled to be finished for November 2012.

**Tree Warden:** Our new warden, Ian Thomson, has already started work and is finding out what needs to be done about the diseased horse chestnut on the Church triangle. It is confirmed that will need felling.

**Highway matters:** Cllr Forrester's initiative to improve the Hunter's Lodge junction continued with a meeting with the Highways Agency, which has agreed to conduct a survey. This will look at all possibilities for improving the junction, include enlarging the Axminster (left turn) slip-lane, provision of traffic lights, and other measures.

**Snow Warden:** Cllr Turner has been trained, and will have trained his band of volunteers by the time you read this. A map of the priority areas for gritting in severe weather has already been drawn up, based on steepness of hills and the number of people using the road. It will never be possible to service the entire parish with

the resources available, so please do not be offended if your lane is not on the map.

**Flood relief:** the Council is still waiting for the contractor to start work on this important project, but did not have a definite date at the time of writing.

**Playground:** the annual inspection report has been received and is linked on the council's web site. Molehills are an intractable problem, and the concrete surface under the bench should be replaced.

**Police:** the meeting was pleased to welcome our Neighbourhood Beat Manager, PC Kevin Bennett. He reported that crime was down in Axminster Rural district, but did warn us not to leave keys or valuables in reach of a letterbox or cat flap – in October, an enterprising burglar stole valuables by using a fishing rod through a cat flap, and a known criminal is a suspect in this case. PC Bennett explained that he is now responsible for both rural and town districts in his beat, so it is inevitable that his presence will not be so obvious. Funding is under extreme pressure, so cuts are inevitable. But on the positive side, this area does have a very low crime rate.

At the end of the meeting, tribute was paid to Terry Daly, who was instrumental in getting the Parish Plan completed some years ago. He will be sadly missed by the team that is now responsible for reviewing the plan.
